How did it get started? Robert Baden-Powell



Scouting began in 1907 and was founded by <u>Robert</u> <u>Baden-Powell</u>, a lieutenant-general in the British Army, serving from 1876 until 1902 in India and Africa.

In 1899, during the Second Boer War in South Africa, Baden-Powell successfully defended the town of Mafeking in a siege that lasted seven months. Baden-Powell's troops were vastly outnumbered, so he used local boys to administer first aid, carry messages and run errands.

On returning to the UK, Baden-Powell realized that boys at home could benefit from similar sorts of activities to the boys at Mafeking. These activities went on to form the basis of the Scouting Movement.

While scouting remains relevant, educational, and

exciting today, it has not strayed too far from its roots; outdoor adventure, helping others and Scouting skills remain the most iconic of its activities.

Scout Oath

On my honor I will do my best to do my duty to God and my country and to obey the Scout Law; to help other people at all times; to keep myself physically strong, mentally awake, and morally straight.

Scout Law

TRUSTWORTHY. Tell the truth and keep promises. People can depend on you.

LOYAL. Show that you care about your family, friends, Scout leaders, school, and country.

HELPFUL. Volunteer to help others without expecting a reward.

FRIENDLY. Be a friend to everyone, even people who are very different from you.

COURTEOUS. Be polite to everyone and always use good manners.

KIND. Treat others as you want to be treated. Never harm or kill any living thing without good reason.

OBEDIENT. Follow the rules of your family, school, and pack. Obey the laws of your community and country.

CHEERFUL. Look for the bright side of life. Cheerfully do tasks that come your way. Try to help others be happy.

THRIFTY. Work to pay your own way. Try not to be wasteful. Use time, food, supplies, and natural resources wisely.

BRAVE. Face difficult situations even when you feel afraid. Do what you think is right despite what others might be doing or saying.

CLEAN. Keep your body and mind fit. Help keep your home and community clean.

REVERENT. Be reverent toward God. Be faithful in your religious duties. Respect the beliefs of others.



1. When and how often does the troop meet?


- Tuesdays 7-8pm
- 2. What is usually discussed in these troop meetings and how long are these meetings?
 - The meetings are 1 hour, and a variety of topics are discussed. All the books are online for more information on each topic. You can look at the books before buying them.
- 3. Who plans the scout activities?
 - Den meetings are planed by the den leaders, and the pack activates are determined by the parents and leaders at the parent meeting. Volunteers are always needed and welcomed.
- 4. What activities are assigned for this year?
 - Please see the calendar for activities, they are subject to change.
- 5. Is there an annual scout's activity program/ list that parents can access online?
 - We have a PDF of the calendar for the year, that is distributed and will be updated and distributed many times through out the year. We also have a calendar that can be subscribed to.
- 6. How are these activities funded?
 - Most activities are not required, but if you choose to come on one of the activities there will be an extra charge possible. For example, a hike could be FREE, but going bowling would be an extra charge to the parents.
- 7. How often do the scouts go camping?
 - As a pack usually 2 times per year, 1 in fall and 1 in the spring. You might go more with your den If the parents of the den decided to go camping.
- 8. What camping has been done before?
 - We are going to camp James Ray in September, there are other cuborees, parent and pal that we have done before. Some actives at the camping have include:
 - Archery, BB gun shooting, Hiking, Swimming, Kickball, tying knots, tug of war, art and crafts, water rockets, just to name a few.
 - How to start a fire property and how to put a fire out properly
 - How to setup a tent correctly and where to place your tent

- 9. How do the scouts advance in ranks?
 - Scouts advance yearly they move from one grade level to the next.
- 10. Does participation in a particular number of activities and/or acquiring skills determine that?
 - Yes, you need to complete each requirement to receive the patch for that grade level. Its not difficult just come to the meetings and it will happen naturally.
- 11. How are the new scouts introduced to the program?
 - The scouts are placed by grade level into a den of kids their age, and they might possible already know them. Mentoring is done by the den leaders, and other leaders, scouts will follow a handbook of tasks throughout the year.
- 12. Is there any other equipment needed?
 - When it comes time to go camping you will need a tent and sleeping bags.
- 13. How much does a year of scouting approximately cost (besides the annual fee and unit charge)?
 - See costs above.
- 14. What is expected of the parents in terms of participation or anything else that you could think of?
 - We want our parents to be involved to watch their kids grow and experience scouting. We always need volunteers. It's more fun when the parents are involved.
- 15. What if bullying occurs?
 - No Bullying is tolerated, let the leaders know if you see any bulling activities and will address the matter with the parents. If it continues the scout will have to be removed.

Bullying Awareness

The idea that a Scout should treat others as he or she wants to be treated—a Scout is kind—is woven throughout the programs and literature of the Boy Scouts of America. When a Scout follows the principles of the Scout Oath and Scout Law, bullying and hazing situations should never occur.
